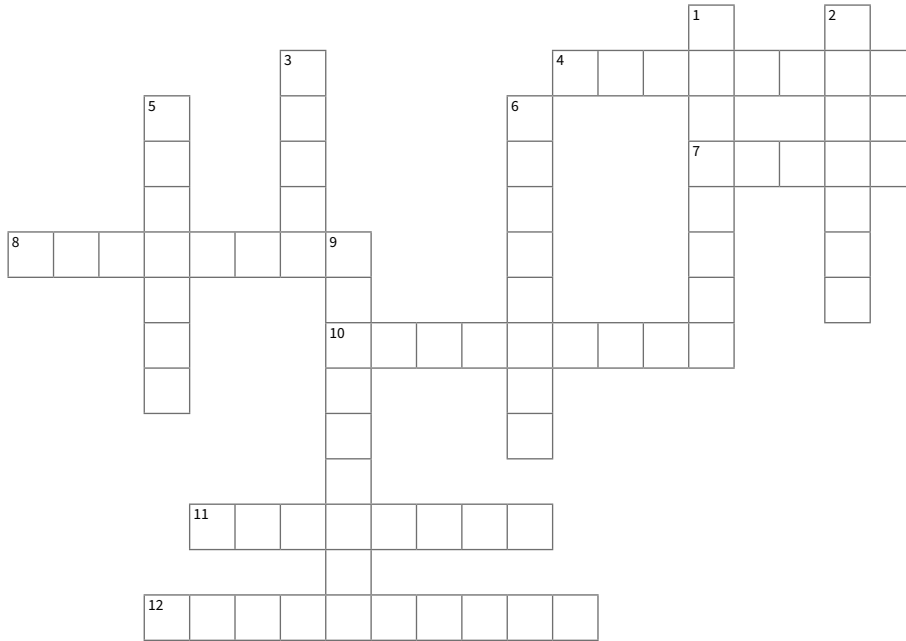

My experience as a **SPORTS VOLUNTEER**

I volunteer for a netball organisation – netball’s a bit like basketball but usually played by women. I’ve never actually done it – it was offered as a sport at school, but I chose football, instead. I rarely bother to turn the TV on for sports matches, as I don’t have a lot of time – I prefer to be out at the weekends and being a volunteer is a great way to do that. I thought it would be interesting to know what netball is.

I do various jobs when I’m volunteering. Matches usually take place on Saturdays, so I arrive early to help check that the court is free of stones or rubbish. Then I prepare drinks and snacks for the players before collecting tickets when spectators start to arrive. There’s nothing particularly hard to do, though sometimes I wouldn’t mind having a bit more of a challenge – maybe to help sort out the matches themselves, like which teams are playing and when. I think I’d be good at that, but I’m not complaining – I enjoy everything I do!

The matches are great fun and I love watching people who are so good at what they do. I always go home feeling amazed. It doesn’t matter to me which team wins, which might sound like a strange thing to say, but the best team always wins on the day and you can’t argue with that, even if the players are unhappy about losing. Spectators do look upset sometimes when their team doesn’t win, but you can understand that. You’d expect the players to behave well, but sometimes they show that they’re annoyed, and that’s a pity, because they’re all nice people, really.

I’d encourage other people to be a volunteer. It’s probably more interesting if you like the sport involved, but it doesn’t matter because you’ll learn a lot about yourself and other people, and make great friends. This isn’t something you can only do if you want to get a job in sport. It’s just good fun and you won’t have to do anything you don’t want to. It’s just nice to spend time with people from your town, outside school or college!

Haroshi's skateboard Sculptures

Japanese artist, Haroshi, creates amazing sculptures from old skateboards.

Haroshi began skateboarding when he was 15 years old and loved it. He went every day and used many skateboards, each of which eventually broke from being used so much. ¹ Over time, he built up a large collection of them. While he was doing so, he learned about different types of skateboard, which not only vary in size and shape but can be built in different ways, too. By the time he was 25, Haroshi had an enormous number of old skateboards.

Keen to do something with them, Haroshi started to cut them up. As he was doing so, he noticed interesting patterns in the wood. He cut up more boards and stuck them on top of each other. ² The first thing he produced from the old wood was a piece of jewellery, but he later became known for his huge 3D sculptures. His ideas came from skateboarding culture, ranging from skateboarding cats to cool trainers, and a variety of other everyday subjects. ³ What this showed was that he had a huge amount of natural talent and was keen to show his work to the world.

Haroshi's work has been seen in several exhibitions, where everything from an enormous bird to a figure of a man in pain have been on display. One sculpture, called *Ordinary life*, looks like a broken leg – a reality of skateboarding – and it is incredible to think that Haroshi designs and creates each sculpture from old wood. ⁴ In the twelfth century, a Japanese sculptor called Unkei placed a glass ball in each of his sculptures, to show that each piece had a heart. ⁵ Inside each of his sculptures is a piece of broken skateboard. The history of

ABBEY ROAD STUDIOS

Abbey Road Studios, where the Beatles recorded most of their work, started its life as a large house, which the record label EMI bought in 1929. The building soon became home to the first purpose-built recording studios in the world, which opened in 1931. Many different types of music have been recorded there, and with its groundbreaking technology, it attracted many big names in the music industry.

In June 1962, the Beatles made their first recording at the studios and between then and 1970, when the band broke up, they recorded 90% of their music in Studio One. The studio is still one of the largest in the world, able to fit a 110-piece orchestra and a 100-person choir at the same time!

The studios developed new ways of producing music, and multi-track recordings (where separate sounds could be recorded and then put together to make a single piece) started to take off because of their innovations. In 1967, the studios and the Beatles made history when the band performed 'All you need is love' live for the first ever satellite TV link-up, which was heard by 350 million people.

The studios really made their name when the Beatles decided to call their second-to-last album *Abbey Road*. Many people consider this to be one of the best albums ever made, and one of the Beatles' most successful. Its cover is recognised all over the world, showing the four musicians crossing the street in front of the studios, guitarist and singer Paul with no shoes on.

As well as the Beatles, many other famous musicians have used the studios to record their songs. These include Oasis, Pink Floyd, the Spice Girls and, more recently, the Killers, Lady Gaga and Coldplay. The studios don't just record music for albums, however. They have also been involved in recording soundtracks for films, perhaps the most famous of which is *Star Wars: Episode 1*.

Because of the studios' close link to the Beatles, many fans of the band go to visit the building. Although it is not possible to go inside the studios, many fans take photos of themselves crossing the road and write graffiti on its garden walls and road signs, remembering the band. Although the studios have struggled in the digital era, they remain a working business, and continue to attract musicians who are keen to follow in the footsteps of the Beatles.

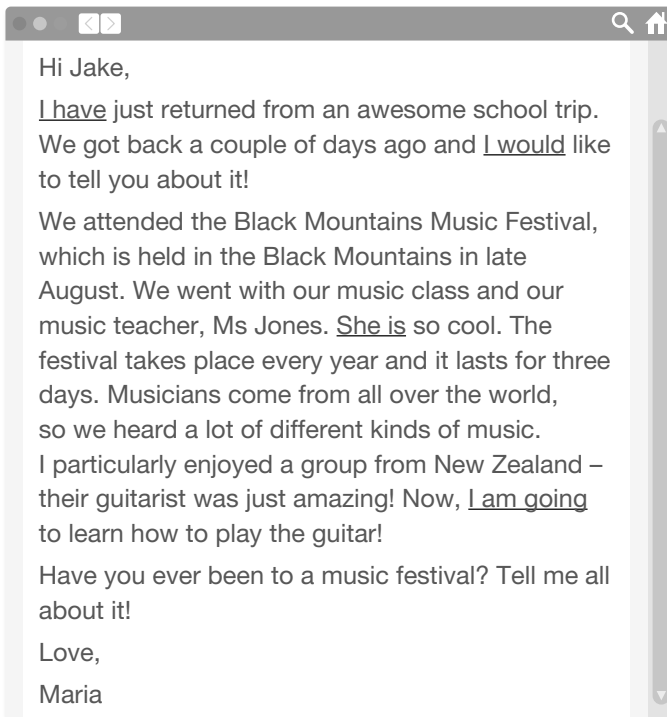

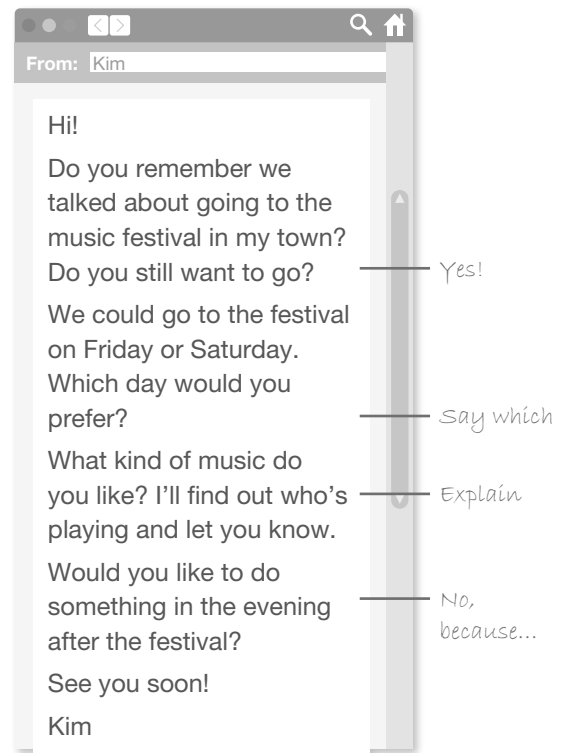

You can even choose which top TT rider to be in the game, and belong to one of the most famous teams.

My final choice is *Gravel*. This game's about off-road racing, and this time you try to become the best at driving through forests, mountains, deserts and many other landscapes. There are lots of events to go to, but you'll have to be the top racer to win them all because there are more than two hundred! These take place in stadiums and on tracks – it really is extreme and something everybody wants to be the best at! It isn't the cheapest game, but it looks fun!

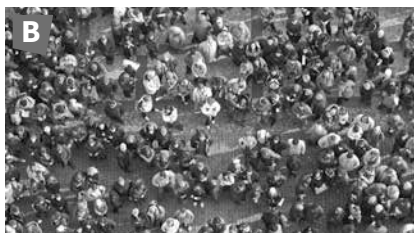

**The school
in the world**

The first day at school can be quite scary for any pupil but imagine being one among 50,000 or more! That is the total number of students at the City Montessori School in Lucknow, India. The school, better known as CMS, employs 4,500 staff including teachers, support staff and others such as cleaners and gardeners.

The school was set up by husband and wife team Dr Jagdish Gandhi and Bharti Gandhi in 1959. The first pupils were the children of family members – and there were only five of them. As time went by, more people started to hear about the school and they wanted their children to attend. Slowly, the numbers rose. Today there are about 20 sites around Lucknow and the school's population is bigger than that of some towns. The school educates students between the ages of 3 and 17. They all wear a uniform and each class has about 45 pupils. But due to the size of the school, it is never possible for everyone to meet as there is no place that is big enough for everyone to fit in. One of the school's heads, Dr Gandhi's daughter Geeta Kingdon, said in an interview that, 'The whole of Lucknow would be jammed if we tried because one bus holds 50 children, so we'd need 1,000 buses to bring everyone together.'

In 2013, the speed at which the school grew was recognised by the *Guinness Book of Records*. It was a proud moment for the school, and was because of the efforts of parents, pupils and teachers, said Dr Gandhi. The school doesn't receive any money from the government and the children's parents are only charged a small amount for their children to attend.

For each pupil, there is also one teacher responsible for his or her health and life outside the classroom. In this way, the staff believe that no one is forgotten. Besides the traditional subjects such as maths, English and geography, the students also learn about world peace. CMS is the only school in the world to be awarded a UNESCO Peace Prize for Education for its efforts in this field.

Today, the school is famous for its exam results and its international exchange programmes. The school has some well-respected past students, who have gone on to work in international organisations. However, within the school, and especially with everyone wearing the same uniform, it can be difficult to get noticed, so the students have to work especially hard. Dr Gandhi believes that the children receive not only an education, but also a love of the world.

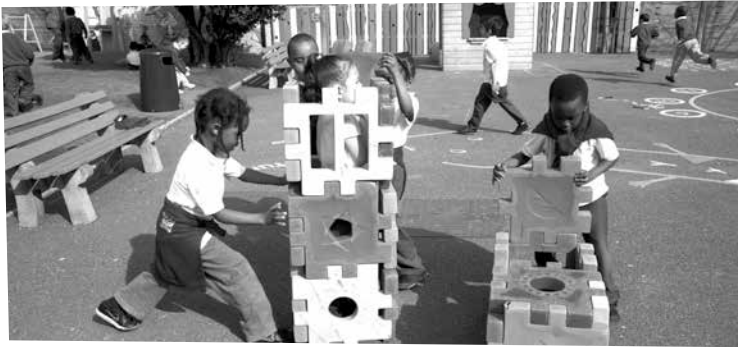

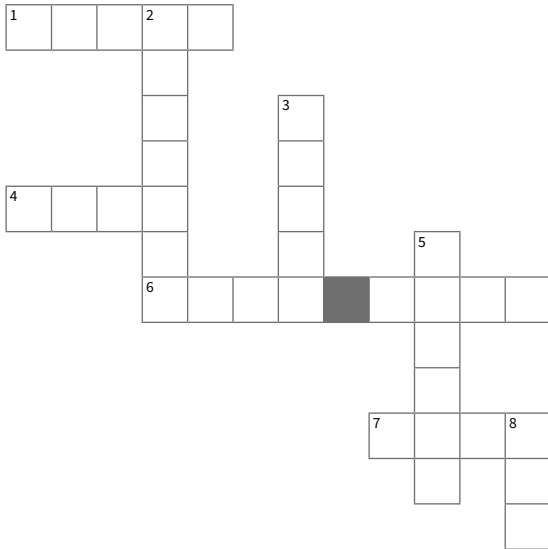

IMPROVING IMAGES OR NOT?

Everybody knows that digital software is used to make images look different. The result of photoshopping? Models and celebrities are changed to look taller and younger; legs become thinner, skin becomes clearer, and hair becomes longer and thicker. There can be extreme edits, and few of those who are happy for their pictures to be photoshopped are likely to admit to it.

But there is a growing number of celebrities who are speaking out against photoshopping. American actor Jennifer Lawrence has made her opinions about it clear in public. She has talked about her body image and the demand to lose weight for her lead role in the hit film *The Hunger Games*. Her character, Katniss, doesn't have enough to eat, so of course the film-makers wanted Lawrence to look thin. The word is that J-Law refused to go on a diet for the part, and also insisted that clever photography should not be used to achieve a similar effect.

Rumer Willis has spoken about being treated unfairly by photographers after her image was altered following a shoot for a well-known magazine with her sisters Scout and Tallulah. The published photo showed that Rumer's jawline had been made smaller. Rumer did not appreciate this change and requested that anyone who had shared the picture online took it down. 'I love the way I look and I won't support anyone who would feel a need to change the way I look to make me more beautiful. Whether or not they realise it, it is a form of bullying, which I won't stand for,' she posted on her Instagram account.

Model Chrissy Teigen also had something to say about photoshopped images at the BeautyCon Festival in 2017. The festival celebrates natural beauty, and encourages people to be true to themselves. 'Nobody knows what a real face looks like any more,' said Chrissy. She also commented on society's unrealistic standards of beauty and how many photoshopped pictures there are on Instagram.

The message that many celebrities want to get out there is that people should learn to accept the way they look, even if it isn't 'perfect'. And it isn't just women who want to promote this idea. For his cover shoot for the American *W* magazine, actor Brad Pitt requested that his photo was not changed. Many more models and celebrities are starting to express similar opinions and disagreeing with the use of photo techniques that produce impossible images. It looks like this is the beginning of a new generation of responsible celebrities.

C E L E B R I T Y SIBLINGS

Imagine how you'd feel if your brother's just brought home an Oscar and you've just got home from a shift in a fast food joint. Would you be annoyed by the difference in your lives? Delighted for his success? Perhaps a bit of both?

Having a world-famous brother or sister has its ups and downs. While your celebrity sister's having her nails done, being given a flash car, or walking round in free designer gear, you're doing your own make-up, riding around on an old bicycle and wondering whether you can afford a new pair of jeans!

This, according to psychologists, could cause what's known as 'sibling rivalry', or conflict between brothers and sisters. While this is normal in most families with siblings, and usually begins at a young age, it can be more of a problem in families where one sibling is a 'high achiever' and another is an 'underachiever'. This is a phenomenon which psychologists say is not uncommon.

Where there's a famous brother or sister in the mix, the 'ordinary' sibling may end up feeling lonely or upset about the attention their sibling receives, while they feel ignored. In the worst case, things can turn nasty, creating a stressful situation for the rest of the family. At this point, it's down to all the family members to show each other how much they value each sibling's achievements, no matter how 'big' or 'small'.



Rivalry, say psychologists, is really a waste of time. Everyone has their own unique set of qualities and weak points. OK, so your brother may be a 'household name', but that doesn't mean you've failed if you don't end up with a million followers on Twitter. The key is to work on achieving your own dreams, making the most of what *you* have to offer.

Of course, not everyone with a celebrity sibling feels bad about it. There can be moments where you feel incredibly proud of what your brother or sister has achieved. And there can be some unexpected benefits, too, such as being handed the designer gear that didn't fit or getting into gigs for free. You might even appear on the red carpet yourself in support of your sibling's new film or album, without the hassle of being asked for selfies and autographs. You can enjoy the good stuff without having to make any effort for it – perfect if you're naturally shy or just not mad about becoming famous yourself!

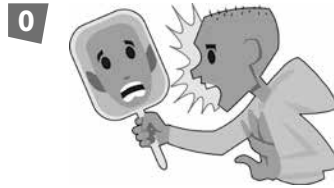

SUCCESS STORIES

Want to be inspired to set up your own business? We spoke to two teenagers who already have.

Adam had always dreamt of working with animals. 'I grew up on a farm, where I was involved with feeding the cows and cleaning the shed where they lived in winter. I didn't mind helping out,' he says. 'We also had a pet dog called Zen, who was a great friend. He would wait for me to come home from school every day, and then I'd take him for a long walk in the woods.'

There were a few older people in the village who had dogs that needed walks, but who couldn't take them very far. One of them asked Adam if he would walk her dog, and once he'd agreed, other people started asking, too. 'I didn't ask for any money, but it gave me an idea for a business – dog-walking!' says Adam. But since he couldn't do any more in the place where he lived, he forgot about it for a few years.

When Adam was thirteen, his family sold the farm and moved to a town where his parents set up their own business. That encouraged Adam to do the same, and he remembered his dog-walking idea. 'My parents helped me print leaflets advertising my services, and suggested a price I could ask. On the first day I received so many calls that I didn't know how to deal with them all!' Adam says. Adam's mother set up a diary for him on her computer and the business quickly became successful. 'Now I aim to employ someone to help me walk the dogs after school!' says Adam.

Another young person who set up their own business is Ellie, aged fifteen. 'I've loved athletics since I was a kid,' she says. 'I hoped to get to the Olympics but I'm not good enough. I thought about giving up.' But Ellie's grandmother believed in her ability to be successful in athletics, even if she couldn't compete at a high level. She encouraged Ellie to keep on training, and when a local sports club was looking for volunteers to help train children, she suggested that Ellie offered to help.

Ellie considered the idea and decided to give it a try. 'I never imagined I'd be a good teacher, but the minute I got on the field and realised how excited the kids were, I knew it was the right thing for me.' Since then, Ellie has set up her own one-to-one athletics training programme and has ten young people who she trains after school. 'I love it!' she says.

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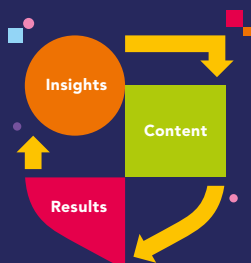
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
